## Grading Rubric and Guidelines for Discussions (25 point total)

Your participation in discussion/s for this learning plan is required. To be eligible to earn full points you must post an original response by Thursday at 11:59 pm MT of the week in which the discussion is due, and reply to at least two classmates' posts by 11:59 pm MT Sunday.

Student's initial response must be substantive or thoughtful, analytical, and at least 100 words. Replies to classmates' responses should be no fewer than 30 words each. The student is held to academic standards of writing style including proper grammar, punctuation, spelling, and the inclusion of references and citations when applicable.

Each discussion question is worth up to 25 points. Your discussion board messages will be graded according to the following rubric:
